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Introduction:

Course Description:

You will be learning about the various nations and cultures that occupy Earth's diverse continents and regions. This course also explores climate and geographical features that have shaped the cultures and economies of people in specific regions around the world.

Classroom Structure and Expectations:

• Be in your seat when the bell rings and prepare to immediately copy the agenda while attendance is taken. You will have three minutes to do so. Please note that if you are late, you must join the class immediately and not be disruptive.

- Teachers have the ability to monitor your internet/Chromebook use. Remember to not only stay on task, but to remain appropriate at all times.
- You are required to have respect for substitutes and to also keep our classroom clean and orderly. It is unfair for me to return and pick up after you.
- Please have respect for the puzzle table (if applicable).
- You are able to earn Miners Gold and shop from the classroom menu.
- Although the textbook is a major part of our class, you are expected to come to class with your assigned Chromebook charged every day.
- Do not abuse bathroom use. You will be using Minga for hall passes and extended use beyond the allotted time results in truancy and/or a contact home. If bathroom use becomes excessive, we will implement the plan that requires you to email your parents every time you want to use the restroom. This affects all students and can be rather unfair.
